What are pysanky?



In the spring, when the earth emerged from the long, cold winter, the ancient Ukrainian people celebrated with ceremonies honoring the sun.

The sun was the Ukrainians' supreme god, but the only creatures able to approach the life-giving star were birds. Hoping the winged creatures could fly high enough to intercede for humanity, Ukrainians inscribed wishes and requests to the heavens on birds' eggs.

These richly decorated eggs are called pysanky.
The pysanky were made as gifts for honored family and friends-talismans meant to bring happiness, fertility, and protection. Each of the elements and colors carried symbolic meaning.

The sun represented happiness, growth, and good fortune.
Flowers signified love, charity, and good will.
Birds, chicks, hens, and roosters symbolized fulfillment of wishes and fertility.
Waves, ribbons, and belts meant eternity.
Red was the color of love and joy.
Yellow represented resurrection and spirituality.
Green was the sign of new life, of prosperity and wealth.
Blue encompassed courage, strength, stability, loyalty, and health.
Pysanky are still made in Ukrainian homes today, and it is this tradition that inspired Julie Paschkis' P. Zonka Lays an Egg.

P. Zonka is a story of springtime, colorful eggs, and appreciating beauty, so a plain old room just won't do. Here are some simple (and a few elaborate) suggestions to get in the spirit:

- Set bouquets of fresh cut flowers around the event area to brighten up the room.
- Display colorful eggs (plastic are fine!) in paper bag nests. Just shred a few brown paper bags and fill a bowl with them. Arrange the strips in a nest shape and add your eggs. Voila!
- Find a chicken or rooster stuffed animal. Kids can use it during storytime and games, but it will also make a great display item.
- Play festive Ukrainian music to set the mood. Here are a few CDs available at local libraries: Songs and Dances of the Ukraine, Anthologies of Folk Music, and Ukraine - Les voix de la steppe.
- If you have the facilities, serve traditional Ukrainian foods! Whip up some pierogi (dumplings), pashka (bread), babka (Easter bread), kulich (Easter cake), or syrniki (cheese pancakes).
- Provide other seasonal treats such as egg-shaped sugar cookies decorated to look like pysanky, Peeps, or rainbow Jell-O Easter eggs.

## Games and Activities

## Nature Color Matching Scavenger Hunt:

Using paint and cardboard egg cartons, send the kids on a scavenger hunt to find colors in nature. Paint each pocket of the egg carton a different color (use shades that can be found in nature!). Then take the children outside to search for natural treasures that match each of the colored pockets. When they find an item, they should put it in the pocket. When the egg carton is full, they win! This can be done as a team (one carton for the whole group, with each child assigned a color) or as a competition (each child has his or her own carton and must find every color without help).

## Felt Board Read Aloud:

Cut out a nest and multiple white, brown, and gray-blue eggs from felt. Read P. Zonka Lays an Egg aloud. As you read, add the items to your felt board. Have kids count the eggs with you as you put them in the nest.

## Egg Shaker Read Aloud:

Fill plastic eggs with jelly beans (or regular beans) to create egg shakers. Give one egg shaker to each child. During storytime, have the children shake the eggs every time Gloria crows!

## Mixed Up Egg Hunt:

Mismatch the tops and bottoms of plastic eggs; your goal is to make each egg have a different color top and bottom. Create a card for each egg by drawing an egg shape and coloring it in to match the plastic egg it represents. Before the children arrive, hide the eggs around the event space. When you're ready to play, pass out a card to each child. The goal is for each child to find the egg that matches his or her card exactly.

## Egg and Spoon Relay:

Split the group into teams. Line each team up behind a basket of plastic Easter eggs and a spoon. Set one empty basket for each team about ten feet away from the starting line. In a relay fashion, each child should place a plastic egg on the spoon, walk in a straight line to the empty basket while balancing the egg, deposit the egg into the basket, and return to the starting line. The first team to transfer all of their eggs from one basket to the other wins!

## Crafts

## Scrap Paper Pysanky: <br> supplies

- 2 sheets per child of cardstock with a large egg outline drawn on each
- Scissors (or a craft blade)
- Assorted scrap papers that you've pre-cut into strips and shapes (You can use tissue paper, scrapbook paper, or even wrapping paper; the more colorful, the better!)
- Glue


## INSTRUCTIONS

1. Cut the egg out of the first sheet without cutting the frame. The result should be a sheet of paper with an egg-shaped hole, but the edges of the paper should be un-cut. If this is too difficult, you can pre-cut the sheet with a blade.
2. Discard the egg shape and set the egg frame aside.
3. Glue the scrap strips and shapes onto the second sheet of cardstock, completely covering the egg outline. Don't worry about going outside the lines. The egg frame you made will cover any rough edges.
4. Finally, glue the first sheet (egg frame) on top of the second sheet (scrap paper egg), creating an egg-shaped frame for the scrap paper design. Ta-da!

## Simple Paper Bag Nests: <br> supplies

- 1 brown paper bag per child
- Scissors


## INSTRUCTIONS

1. Cut off the top of your paper bag, leaving $3-4$ inches of bag from the base.
2. Carefully roll the top edge of the bag out and down.
3. Continue loosely rolling the bag until you get to the bottom.
4. Pinch it to add shape to the nest.

## Scratch Art Pysanky:

supplies

- 1 sheet of card stock per child
- Oil pastels
- Black tempera paint
- Paint brushes
- Scissors
- Toothpicks


## INSTRUCTIONS

1. Cover an entire sheet of card stock with oil pastels. Use lots of different colors and designs.
2. Cover the entire sheet with slightly watered-down tempera paint.
3. Allow to dry completely.
4. Cut the cardstock in the shape of an egg.
5. Gently scratch off the tempera paint with a toothpick to reveal the pastels underneath. Scratch the paint in whatever patterns or designs you want!

## Easy Pysanky Decoration

Creating pysanky can be a laborious and very complicated process, but it can also be pretty simple and kid-friendly! Here is a guide to the latter version.

Note: For these instructions, we will assume that you will use yellow, red, green, blue, and black dyes. You do not have to use all or any of these colors. No matter which colors you use, apply the dye in order from lightest to darkest.

## Supplies

- Crayons
- Cups or bowls for dye
- Egg dye and/or food coloring* *(yellow, red, green, blue, and black)
- Hard-boiled eggs
- Mini muffin tin


## Instructions

1. Cover a table with several layers of newspaper.
2. Mix dyes according to instructions.
3. Add a spoon to each dye cup and line them up on your work surface, progressing from light to dark (in order: yellow, red, green, blue, and black).
4. Create a design for your pysanky and choose where you'd like each color to appear on the egg.
5. If you won't use white in your design, proceed to step 7.
6. If you will use white in your design, draw the part that should remain white onto the egg with a crayon. Make sure that any lines or spaces that you want to be white are completely covered. Wherever there is wax, the yellow dye will not be able to penetrate.
7. Dip the egg in the yellow die. Allow the egg to sit for 2 minutes or until it achieves the desired vibrancy.
8. Use the spoon to remove the egg from the dye and pat it completely dry with paper towels.
9. When the egg is completely dry, use a crayon to draw the yellow part of your design. Make sure that any lines or spaces that you want to be yellow are completely covered in crayon.
10. Repeat steps $7-9$ with the red, green, blue, and black dyes.
11. Spread paper towels over your mini muffin tin and place one egg in each cup.
12. Bake the eggs at 250 degrees for 5 minutes.
13. Remove the tin from the oven, and carefully blot away any moisture from the egg shells.
14. If any wax is melted, use a paper towel to gently rub it off AFTER blotting the moisture droplets.
15. Return the tin to the oven and bake for another 3 minutes, repeat as necessary. Do this until you've melted and rubbed off all of the wax, revealing your final design!
